2) NEW JOB OPPORTUNITY: STREET WISE PARTNERS



The mission of Street Wise Partners is to leverage mentorship to increase employment opportunities in New York City, Washington, D.C. and Detroit. Street Wise Partners

pairs volunteers with mentees who are unemployed or underemployed to provide them with the skills, resources, and networks they need to secure and maintain employment.

The Community Outreach and Program Manager will be responsible for facilitating four mentoring programs each year, as well as other special events related to workforce development. The Manager also serves as the lead for all Washington, D.C. mentee recruitment including overseeing relationships with community partners and executing strategic participant outreach and intake. The Manager will drive strategic communication and relationship building, and will be responsible for the recruitment, screening, and acceptance of approximately 120 mentees each year.

This is a full-time position in Washington, D.C. and reports to the D.C. Program Director. The role is currently virtual but may return to in-person in the future. Evenings are required.

Responsibilities include:

- Facilitate four, 13-week mentoring programs each year, serving approximately 180 adults from under-represented communities who are seeking employment. Programs are offered twice a year.
- Administer the StreetWise Partners program curriculum through weekly, 2 hour mentoring workshops with mentees and mentors in a group setting; program is currently run virtually and may transition to a hybrid (virtual and in-person) model in the future.
- Facilitate both large and small group activities on goal setting, resumes, LinkedIn profiles, elevator pitches and more; stay up to date on hiring trends and workforce development.
- Engage tenured volunteers to serve as facilitation partners; guide lead volunteers on program execution.
- Provide support to all mentors and mentees; problem solve program issues with mentoring pairs, monitor participant compliance with program standards and offer feedback on program deliverables.
- Lead mentor-mentee matching process; develop strategies to create strong matches based on industry, demographics, communication style and personality traits.
- Advise on curriculum updates and volunteer trainings based on program feedback and discussion.
- Use Salesforce to track and report on mentoring data.

Qualifications:

- Bachelor's Degree or equivalent experience; 2+ years working in social services and experience in mentoring or workforce development a plus.

- Ability to work 2 evenings a week, as well as occasional additional evenings to assist with special events.
- Excitement to share lessons learned, creatively problem solve, explore best practices and continuously improve service delivery.
- Public speaking and facilitation skills are required.
- Excellent communication and interpersonal skills.
- Committed to social justice and racial equity; sincere interest in the mission.

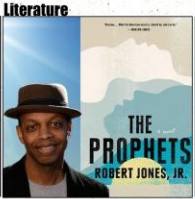

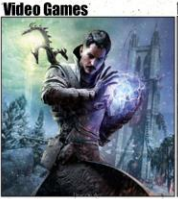

5) SIGMA TAU DELTA



Sigma Tau Delta is always looking to welcome new members.

Membership Requirements:

- Candidates for undergraduate membership must have completed a minimum of two college courses in English language or literature beyond the usual requirements in freshman English. The candidate must have a minimum of a B or equivalent average in English and in general scholarship and must have completed at least three semesters or five quarters of college course work. Candidates for undergraduate membership need not be majoring or minoring in the discipline of English.
- Candidates for graduate membership who did not hold undergraduate membership must be enrolled in a graduate program in English or one of its specializations, have completed six semester hours of graduate work or the equivalent, and have a minimum grade point average of 3.3 on a 4.0 scale.
- Lifetime Membership Fee: \$80. \$40 goes to the Nu Nu chapter, which will bestow you with Honor Cords and a Medallion at your Induction Ceremony that you can wear during graduation. The other \$45 goes to Sigma Tau Delta's national office, which will supply you with your Sigma Tau Delta society pin and certificate. The fee must be paid in cash.
