

Dr. Weldon Jackson

Provost, Bowie State University



Dr. Weldon Jackson currently serves as Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Bowie State University, a position he has held since July 9, 2012. He oversees the Division of Academic Affairs, which includes four Academic Colleges; the Graduate School; Enrollment Management; Planning, Assessment and Accountability; Academic Advisement; Sponsored Programs and Research; Continuing Education; Library Services; and Academic Computing.

During his brief tenure at Bowie State, Weldon has led the revision of the university's strategic plan using a shared governance model and orchestrated a new approach to enrollment management that yielded an increase in enrollment in fall 2013 after several years of static enrollment growth. Moreover, Weldon has advanced the university's course redesign initiative and assisted in effectuating the institution's first signature program, Education

Innovation Initiative (ei2), which uses an integrated approach to teaching and learning in STEM, the arts and humanities-related disciplines. As a strong proponent of faculty development, Weldon has supported a broad range of programs, services, and resources to assist faculty in achieving success in their academic careers.

Prior to his appointment at Bowie State, Weldon served as Special Assistant to the President at Morehouse College (January 2012-July 2012). Previously, he served as the Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at Morehouse (2010-2011) and Executive Vice President and Provost at Manhattan College in Riverdale, New York (1996-2010), and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Morehouse College (1985-1996).

After beginning his academic career as a faculty member in the Black Studies department at Wellesley College in Wellesley, Massachusetts, Weldon ascension through the ranks of higher education afforded him the opportunity to lead and manage the operations of various academic divisions, information technology, academic support, admissions, campus ministries, special sessions, student retention, faculty recruitment, retention, and professional development, graduate programs, continuing education programs, assessment, strategic planning, and university/ college accreditations, including the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB), the Teacher Education Accreditation Council (TEAC), the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE), as well as the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET).

Weldon has affiliations with many organizations, including the American Political Science Association, Council of Independent Colleges and Universities (CICU), the American Council on Education. He holds the Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science from Morehouse College and the Ph.D. degree in Government from Harvard University.

Syndicated Columnist



Ms. Michelle Singletary is a nationally syndicated columnist for The Washington Post. Her column, "The Color of Money" is an awardwinning column, which is now carried in more than 100 newspapers.

She is the author of three books, "Spend Well, Live Rich: How to Live Well With the Money You Have (Random House);" "Your Money and Your Man: How You and Prince Charming Can Spend Well and Live Rich" (Random House), and the recently published "The Power to Prosper: 21 Days to Financial Freedom," published by Zondervan, a HarperCollins company. "Your Money and Your Man" was a finalist in 2006 for "Books for a Better Life," which honors the best self-improvement books. This highly regarded award promotes the importance of one of the largest and fastest-growing segments in the book publishing business.

In 2011, "Spend Well, Live Rich with Michelle Singletary" premiered on WNED-TV Buffalo/Toronto. The one-hour special began airing on other PBS stations in 2012. "When Michelle Singletary was featured in the WNED production 'Your Life, Your Money' (2009), we knew her sage financial guidance warranted its own distinct vehicle for presen-

tation," said WNED President and CEO Donald K. Boswell. "WNED is pleased to have worked with Michelle to create this national special for public television. Her sound advice is both engaging and empowering."

Singletary was a regular personal finance contributor for National Public Radio's afternoon program "Day To Day." She was also a frequent contributor to various NPR programs including "Talk of the Nation" and American Public Media's "Marketplace Money." She has appeared on all three major networks, NBC, ABC and CBS. She has prepared personal finance segments for local and national news programs, and for a number of cable and nationally syndicated programs, including "Oprah," NBC's "Today Show," "The Early Show on CBS," CNN, MSNBC, "The View," and "Tavis Smiley" on PBS. She has also appeared on "Meet The Press."

In her spare time, Singletary is the director of "Prosperity Partners Ministry," a program she founded at her church, First Baptist Church of Glenarden, in which women and men, who handle their money well, volunteer to mentor others who are having financial challenges. This is a 10-month program with a typical participation of about 150 people. Once a month, Singletary conducts a three-hour workshop for the ministry group on topics that range from tithing, to developing a budget to getting out of debt. Singletary also started a prison outreach program in Maryland to teach soon-to-be released male and female male inmates how to be better money managers. She and a group of volunteers regularly hold workshops in the correctional facilities. In 2010, Singletary was named Ministry Leader of the Year at First Baptist Church of Glenarden for your direction of Prosperity Partners and for her prison volunteer work.

Just a year after starting her column, The Washington Post nominated it for a Pulitzer Prize. Her column won a prestigious award from the Society of American Business Editors and Writers. She won Best in Business for a series of columns that ran in 2007. The judges wrote: "Michelle Singletary's work illustrates a range of writing that's both approachable and explanatory. She is a graduate of the University of Maryland at College Park, and The Johns Hopkins University, where she earned a master's degree in business and management. Singletary and her husband reside in Maryland with their three children.

Standardized tests for incoming BSU students indicated that their proficiency levels for critical thinking, information literacy and technological competencies were lower than expected. An intervention, Research 101 Learning Modules, was developed and applied as an initial pilot study in fall 2013. The results of the pilot study revealed that full participation in the learning modules significantly impacted the overall mean score for the cohort. During Bulldog Academy 2014, the learning module was implemented and analyzed for effectiveness in improving student proficiency levels. Findings will be shared during the session where faculty will also have the opportunity to experience the Research 101 learning modules.
