

His latest article, "An Interview with National Leaders in the Arts and the Humanities," was published in the inaugural issue of Public Humanities — an open-access scholarly journal published by Cambridge University Press.

Served As Invited Speaker to Analyze Latin American Geopolitics on "Battle of Ideas"


On January 10, 2025, Dr. Frederick Mills, Professor of Philosophy in the Department of History and Government, participated as an invited speaker on a panel for the program "Battle of Ideas." This panel examined the geopolitical context of the struggle for independence and integration in Latin America, as well as the recent presidential election in Venezuela. The discussion was transmitted live in both English and Spanish on Radio Negro Primero, a community-based radio station in Venezuela, and was also accessible via Zoom. Dr. Mills grounded his remarks in the framework provided by Enrique Dussel's Politics of Liberation.






Advancing Student Success: The Role of Integrated Academic Support in HBCU Curriculum Design

This proposed research project seeks to advance existing knowledge as it examines the gap and reviews the impact of integrating tutoring and library services into the curriculum design on student success, with Bowie State University, an HBCU, as the sample instrument of analysis. The specific focus will be on understanding how these integrated services influence academic performance, retention rates, and overall student engagement.

Student Success Coordinator, Ebone Johnson, in partnership with the Dean for the Library, Sophia Sotilleo, will present their proposed research study at the annual conference of the National Organization for Student Success (NOSS) geared towards the integration of tutoring and library services for students' success. While studies highlight the positive impact of tutoring and library services on student success, there is a gap in research specifically addressing the impact of integration into curriculum designed particularly at and for HBCUs.




Black Founders in Innovation





A Platform for Collaboration: Bowie State's Initiative Fosters Strategic Alliances in Federal Procurement

Dr. Matthew Crosston, Director of Academic Transformation, led a group of Bowie State staff this past summer and fall to help build and create, in fulfillment of a major grant from the Small Business Administration, new curriculum that provides a 7-week training course for HBCUs and 8(a) small businesses to collaborate and team together in order to compete for and win federal government contracting awards. This Federal Contracting Collaborative Accelerator is now complete and the first cohort of more than 15 HBCUs and 8(a) small businesses will begin at the end of this February. The program leverages a two-tiered, two-phased approach combining structured training, practical coaching, and collaborative engagement to prepare the participants to pursue federal procurement opportunities effectively. This innovative curricular approach is the first of its kind amongst both HBCUs and participating corporations that have long-wanted greater training to gain access to potential HBCU partners.



Collaborative Effort Brings Cutting-Edge Plant Tissue Culture Facility to Bowie State







The Department of Natural Sciences has established a state-of-the-art plant tissue culture facility, a project led by Dr. George Ude and his Postdocs (Dr. Kishan Saha and Dr. LH Stevenson Naitchede). The new facility is a significant achievement in plant biology research at Bowie State University. This facility will support the mass propagation of bananas and plantains (Musa spp.), the conservation of rare and endangered species, and the production of disease-free plants. It provides a controlled environment equipped with sterile culture rooms, growth chambers, and a media preparation room for plant tissue culture studies. The main goal of this facility is to build a second international Musa germplasm gene bank to complement the only Center that currently exists in Belgium. We extend our gratitude to the Bowie State University Administration for the Title III funding that enabled us to establish the new facility. This new tissue culture facility represents an initial and major step in the advancement of plant biotechnology research at Bowie State University.

Bowie State University Faculty Published His Third Book; Applications of Traditional Archery in the World

Dr. Kaya collaborated with over 20 international scholars to write about his third book project, "Application of Traditional Archery in the World". He does not only serve as an editor, but also he wrote three chapters in his book. His book is part of the five-book series that he established a publishing deal with one of the world's best social science publishers, Nova Science Publishers, Inc, NY.

About the Book

Applications of Traditional Archery in the World covers the world's most popular traditional archery sports from a historical perspective to present day.

Historically, traditional archery has been widely used, and it changed the way people fought wars, hunted, and spent leisurely time. In addition to covering traditional archery from a historical point of view the book also provides guidance about culture, current applications, and present rules and regulations of traditional archery that everybody in the field of traditional sports and games needs to learn.

The well-written book is a contribution of twenty-five authors and experts from sixteen countries with many popular traditional archery sports. It is the most comprehensive work on the subject matter to date, and it will be of extreme value to teachers, athletes, coaches in traditional sports, scholars in sports science, sports historians, physical educators, people in sports ministries, and agencies. In addition to educating and entertaining, this book gives readers a connection on a personal level to all those united by this shared physical and cultural heritage, and it will advance understanding of and enjoyment for the sacred games of traditional archery. Appointed Lead Editor for Scholarly Project on 21st Century Hybrid Warfare

Dr. Matthew Crosston, Director of Academic Transformation, has been asked by the Balkan History Association to be lead editor on a newly commissioned book project entitled, "The 21st Century Hybrid War: Reactions from the European Periphery on Russian-Ukrainian Crises." The volume will analyze what the last twenty years of Ukrainian crises have wrought in terms of long-term implications, with special focus on stability and security throughout the European periphery. The volume's ultimate research goal aims to elucidate what effects there are for neighboring countries having to deal with the de facto "Proxy Cold War" currently raging between the United States and Russian Federation. The group Crosston has been asked to head consists of members of the Romanian National Intelligence Academy, the War Studies University in Warsaw, and the Military Academy of Lithuania. It is hoped that the finished product will be concluded before the end of the 2025 calendar year.
