# **Course Objectives**

## Geography is the science of place, space, and environment.

Political Geography is the study of the ways geographic space is organized within and by political processes, in other words, it focuses on the spatial expression of political behavior. This course aims to give students a critical introduction to political geography and geopolitics. To accomplish this goal we will focus on international and global perspectives within political geography and examine the ways in which humans have arranged the territory of the Earth's surface; we will analyze the internal and external relationships of politically organized areas and examine the effects of political actions on social and economic conditions, and the significance of geographical factors behind political situations, problems, and conflicts.

## At the end of the semester, you should be able to:

- ~ identify the linkage between popular culture and foreign policy
- $\sim$  exemplify the way non-state geopolitical actors represent their codes
- $\sim$  define the terms nation, state, and nation-state
- $\sim$  discuss nationalism in the context of globalization
- $\sim$  understand the concepts of geopolitical agency and geopolitical codes
- $\sim$  discuss the role of boundaries in the construction of national identity
- ~ discuss the geopolitics of globalization
- ~ discuss the geopolitics of natural resources
- $\sim$  understand how environmental threats are represented
- ~ understand the complexity or "messiness" in geopolitics
