Optional Book (Text): Africa: Geographies of Change by Richard Grant. Oxford University Press, 2015. Although this is not a required book for this course, it is available in the bookstore and I encourage everyone to get a copy as there is valuable information that can act as a supplement to your lectures.

I. Course Description:

Africa is the birthplace of humanity. This vast continent is as diverse in landscape and people as the 54 countries it holds. In this Geography of Africa (GEOG 220) course, we will travel the length and breadth of this diverse continent and explore various issues that affect Africa. We will look at various aspects of Africa's geography such as physical, cultural, political, ethnic, wildlife, language, economic, urban geography and much more. This course is intended to give you a broad and moderately thorough knowledge of Africa and African issues.

II. Course Objectives:

The course curriculum is designed so that students acquire and demonstrate college-level proficiency and essential skills. The course objectives for this course will assess each student's proficiency in the following competencies:

- C1. Oral and written communication
- C2. Critical analysis and reasoning
- C3. Technological competency
- C4. Information literacy

By the end of the course the student should:

- Be able to communicate effectively in writing and in classroom discussions (online) and oral presentations their understanding of important emerging issues and geographical influences on these issues.
- Have gained a thorough competence of different locations in Africa.
- Have acquired a richer understanding of the environmental, demographic, cultural, geopolitical and socio-economic characteristics of different regions in Africa that will enhance their competencies in critical analysis and reasoning.

- **IV. Modes of Instruction:** PowerPoint lectures, discussions, short videos, novel and short article readings, written papers, and library and internet research.
- V. Chapters Covered: We will cover 7 modules/chapters. Each chapter will be covered over 1-2 weeks. Every chapter will have a power point presentation along with readings/videos/assignments/quizzes. All assignments/quizzes pertaining to that chapter will be due by 11:59 PM EDT on the last day of that chapter (Sunday night in most cases). The due dates will be clearly posted for each chapter. Late assignments will not be accepted!
- **VI.** Modes of Evaluation and Assessment: This course is worth <u>400 points</u> and students' performance will be evaluated using the following instruments:
 - 1) Exam 1 = 75 points
 - 2) Exam 2 = 75 points
 - 3) Write-ups and misc. activities = 120 points
 - 4) Novel Write-ups/quizzes = 80 points
 - 5) Term Paper = 50 points

VII. General overview of the various activities for points (Specific details will be provided as each chapter is posted)

- <u>Exams</u> There will be two Exams in this class.
- <u>Video Assignments</u> Video assignments will be posted along with each chapter. Most times, a write-up/quiz about the video will be part of the chapter assignment/s.
- <u>Novel Write-ups/quizzes</u> After reading each set of readings from the novel "A Long Way Gone: Memoirs of a Boy Soldier," students will write a summary and/or take a quiz on the assigned chapters.
- <u>Article Write-ups</u> There will be several short articles that students will read from time to time. A short summary of the articles will be written after each reading.

• <u>Term Paper</u> – The topic of the paper will be discussed the week after Spring break and you will have approximately four weeks to complete your paper.

VIII. Policies on Plagiarism, Attendance, Deadlines, and Conduct:

- Plagiarism: It will be taken for granted that any work, oral or written, that a student does for any course is his/her original work. Any violation of this rule constitutes plagiarism.
