I. <u>COURSE PREREQUISITES:</u> GOVT 130/GOVT 140

II. <u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>:

This course is designed to provide students with an understanding of the basic concepts, principles, and research methods employed in social science.

III. <u>REQUIRED TEXT:</u>

- **IV EMERGING ISSUES**: This course is shaped by Bowie State University's overall effort to address issues of environmental preservation and social justice. Throughout this course, students will be encouraged to consider historical and emerging environmental and social justice issues. Additionally, students will be encouraged to reflect on what role and connection they have to these and other issues shaping social science research discussions and activities which address these issues in the United States and across the globe.

- **VII LIBRARY REQUIREMENTS**: Students will be required to utilize the holdings of the university's library as well as other accessible repositories, government sites, and policy think tanks to complete public policy assignments. This course will introduce students to primary and secondary sources/data, reference materials, and resources utilized in political science writing and discussions.

VIII TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS:

IX COURSE OBJECTIVES AND STUDENT OUTCOMES:

Course Objectives:

- 1. Introduce students to research expectations for political science students through assigned readings, lecture, and discussion.
- 2. Develop students' research skills through lecture, writing assignments, instructor feedback, and in-class participation activities.
- 3. Enhance students' communication skills through discussion, in-class participation activities, discussion board assignments, the completion of a research paper, and oral presentation of research.
- 4. Encourage students to consider historical and contemporary factors that have shaped the scope and methods of political science research through lecture, discussion, and required readings.
- 5. Enhance students technological skills as used for the completion of writing assignments, in-class participation activities, and a research paper
- 6. Strengthen students critical thinking skills through the completion of a research paper.

Student Learning Outcomes: At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. ...synthesize multiple scholarly articles into one coherent discussion.
- 2. ...develop a political science research question.
- 3. ...communicate research finding in both written and oral format.
- 4. ...utilize technology to access appropriate scholarly resources for the completion of research.
- 5. ...describe different methods used to conduct political science research.
- 6. ...articulate issues shaping political science research.

X <u>TEACHING MODES</u>:

Students will be instructed in Scope and Methods of Social Science Research. This course will incorporate multiple teaching resources and approaches including lecture, class discussion, writing assignments, examination, and collaborative learning activities. This course is designed to introduce students to dominant and emerging issues shaping research and researchers in the field of political science. The course will be guided by selected readings, audio, and visual material. Collaborative and individual research activities will be incorporated to supplement lecture, discussion, and reading/audio/visual materials. Additionally, students will be guided in constructing a research question, defining key concepts, identifying and synthesizing supporting scholarly sources in a literature review, providing a methodological approach to answer the question, and analyzing both primary and secondary data in a research paper.

XI. STUDENT PREPARATION:

To prepare for class, student will be expected to consistently utilize the syllabus and Blackboard resources. It will serve as means for communication outside of class. Students will be expected to read all materials prior to class and be prepared to discuss any guiding questions presented on the syllabus for the day. Preparation for class will be reflected in completion of weekly assigned readings, outside research, timely submission of assignments, along with active and informed participation. Students are asked to be on time for the course.

XII. ATTENDANCE and LATE POLICY:

This is a synchronous online course. Attendance is required to complete the course successfully. Attendance is monitored through weekly assignments and participation. Attendance is taken during the virtual class period. University rules and regulations state that a student may fail a course if he/she misses a certain number of classes [six (6) for a course that meets three (3) times a week; four (4) for a class that meets twice a week; and two (2) for a class that meets once a week]. Students are participate in all activities each week. All students are expected to take examinations and turn in all assignments at the scheduled time. In-class participation activities and extra credit activities cannot be made up. All written assignments and discussion board responses to others are due by Monday 11:59pm. Initial post for discussion board activities are always due by Saturday 11:59pm. Make-up work will be at the discretion of the instructor. Late work will be accepted up to one week after original due date with a 10% penalty. (For example 90 - 10% penalty= 81 grade). After one week, the late assignment is converted to a zero. Late discussion board activities cannot be made up. They must be completed during the assigned week. No assignments will be accepted after the final day of class (December 13).

XIII. STATEMENT OF ETHICAL AND PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS FOR THE COURSE:

Researchers, therefore, must be careful to acknowledge sources to give proper credit for borrowed materials. The following rules should be observed to ensure the distinction between one's own words and ideas and those of others is justly maintained. Submitting a paper that is completely the work of another person is plagiarism in its most extreme form.

- 1. Words, phrases, and sentences of another person should be enclosed in quotation marks and footnoted in proper form.
- 2. Paraphrases and summaries of the ideas of others should be indicated with a footnote. These paraphrases and summaries should not represent merely the rearrangement of sentence elements but should be rewritten in one's own style.
- 3. Quotations, paraphrases, and summaries should be introduced with the name of the writer being cited.
- 4. Every item footnoted in the paper (i.e., all sources of other's words and ideas) should appear in the bibliography in proper form.

5. Footnotes should contain all the information required by standard footnote form and specifically indicate the location of the material cited. Page numbers should be checked for accuracy before a paper is submitted; the reader must be able to find the source of the material quoted, paraphrased, or summarized.
