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HYPOTHESES

Students who live on campus are more satisfied with their lives.



RESULTS


Hypothesis:

- ❖ Students who live on campus are more satisfied with their lives.
- ❖ $F(2, 41) = 0.35, p = 0.71$ Not Significant



PARTICIPANTS

- ❖ 44 Students
- ❖ 30 (68.2%) Women/14 (31.8%) Men
- ❖ Average Age = 23.62
- ❖ Race
 - ❖ African American (N = 40; 90.9%),
 - ❖ Latino (N =; 4.5%),
 - ❖ Native American (N = 1.; 2.3%)
 - ❖ Biracial (N=1; 2.3%)



MEASURES



- ❖ Residence:
 - ❖ On Campus (N = 20; 45.5%)
 - ❖ Off Campus alone or with Roommates (N= 7; 15.9%)
 - ❖ Off Campus with family (N = 17; 38.6%)
- ❖ Satisfaction with Life Scale (Kjell & Diener, 2021; 3 items)
 - ❖ Range: 3-21 (Average = 13.16 or somewhat satisfied with life)

DISCUSSION

- ❖ There was no difference between students who lived on or off campus in terms of life satisfaction although students on campus have greater access to professor, student activities, and peers.
- ❖ There are positive aspects of living on and off campus for college students.
