


# Academic Success In Multiple Homes

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## HYPOTHESES

This study aims to determine if students from single parent households have had less family support for school and have lower GPAs



## PARTICIPANTS

- ❖ 54 Students
- ❖ 49 Women/5 Men
- ❖ Race
  - African American (51)
  - Latino(a)/ Hispanic (1)
  - Asian/ Pacific Islander (1),
  - Middle Eastern (1)
- ❖ Classification
  - Freshman (1)
  - Sophomore (1)
  - Junior (9)
  - Senior (43)



## MEASURES

- ❖ GPA (Range: 2.5-2.99 & 3.0-3.499)
- ❖ Single Parent Households N = 21; Two Parent Households N = 22



## RESULTS

Single Parent Homes vs. Double Parent Homes and Having A Higher GPA

$$\diamond t(41) = -605, p = .549$$

Not Significant



## DISCUSSION

The results of this study suggest the following:

- ❖ There is no significant difference from single parent households and double parent households when it comes to academic success and as far as having a high GPA.
