Workshop: Mental and Emotional Letting Go: A Difficult Executive Functioning Process

Dr. Ometha Lewis-Jack is currently a tenured Associate Professor and Chairperson of the Department of Psychology at Bowie State University. She received her Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology, Master of Science and Doctorate in Clinical Psychology from Howard University where she specialized in Clinical Neuropsychology. Dr. Lewis-Jack (A.K.A Nana Atei Asiedu) is a trained and graduated priestess/healer in the Akan Tradition. She is a licensed Clinical Psychologist and Neuropsychologist. Her research interests include the role of spirituality in the diagnosis and treatment of mental disorders. She also researches how the neuropsychological sequelae of brain injuries among African Americans are portrayed differently from other ethnic groups, based on cultural variables. Her recent work has been on the relationship between personality styles, executive functioning, and learning outcomes among students at a HBCU. Dr. Lewis-Jack has been able to incorporate traditional African principles and healing practices into her teachings and therapeutic work. Her goal is to help people establish a healthy balance between their physical, mental, and spiritual lives.
