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Tailored Academic Support

GRADUATE WRITING SERVICES



Research editors at the Graduate Research Center focus on helping graduate students grow as academic writers and scholars across disciplines. We support students at any stage in the writing process. We provide feedback on a range of work including research papers, literature reviews, dissertation chapters, grant proposals, and conference presentations.

Offerings:

Brainstorming Consultations

Students talk through approaches they are considering for starting an assignment, drafting sections of longer manuscripts, or even working through structural issues in a current draft. The consultation focuses on using dialogue to explore ideas, ask questions, and gain clarity. Brainstorming consultations are scheduled 24 hours in advance and require an assignment sheet or a short project description.

Read Ahead Consultations

Students will identify a specific challenge that they are facing in a current draft. An editor will read student work before the consultation. The consultation centers on using dialogue to provide constructive feedback, potential strategies, and resources for overcoming the challenge. Consultations are scheduled 48 hours in advance. Requirements for making the appointment include an assignment sheet or a short project description in addition to 5-8 double-spaced manuscript pages or slides.

Thesis/Dissertation Support Groups:

Weekly, noncommittal groups will offer a supportive, flexible space for writers to meet the demands of revising manuscripts and take advantage of dedicated writing time. Sessions will also feature brief workshops focused on enhancing your writing process, trying new revision strategies, using feedback effectively, maximizing writing time, and more.

Dissertation Workshop Series:

The Dissertation Workshop Series guides doctoral students through writing and refining key sections of the dissertation. Workshops will focus on writing a clear problem statement, crafting a comprehensive literature review, describing research methodologies, presenting findings, and highlighting a study's significance.

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SPOTLIGHT

ADEOLA OSHIYEMI

Management Information Systems

Meet Adeola Oshiyemi, a graduate student in the Master of Science in Management Information Systems program at Bowie State University, whose academic and professional journey reflects a strong commitment to leveraging technology, people, and process to drive organizational excellence.

Oshiyemi's academic focus sits at the intersection of Management Information Systems, Human Resources, and Project Management, where she explores how digital systems and human capital strategies can strengthen organizational performance and support effective talent management. During her time at Bowie State University, she contributed to research on family-friendly programs and insider threat management, while also leading multiple collaborative team projects that applied agile methodologies to real-world organizational challenges. Together, this body of work reflects a deep interest in digital transformation, workforce strategy, and data-informed decision-making.



As a Graduate Assistant, Oshiyemi supported faculty-led research and program development initiatives, contributing to departmental projects such as the Philanthropy Fellowship. Her research and academic work were complemented by meaningful professional accomplishments, including playing a key role in hiring 30 employees within six months in an HR and recruiter capacity. She also coordinated high-impact digital projects at Sterling Bank, delivered multiple initiatives as a Scrum Master, and demonstrated leadership through publishing research and mentoring teams across academic and professional environments.

Oshiyemi's work is grounded in a strong methodological foundation. Her graduate projects utilized mixed-methods research, combining qualitative approaches such as faculty-assisted action research and program evaluations with quantitative techniques including data analysis and performance measurement. Professionally, she has applied agile project management, HR analytics, digital product evaluation, and customer feedback analysis, using tools such as Tableau, Excel, and HRIS systems to translate data into actionable insights.

Beyond academics and professional practice, Oshiyemi has demonstrated a sustained commitment to leadership and service. She has served for over a decade as President of Kings Charity Court (NGO), where she coordinated community outreach initiatives focused on education, welfare, and empowerment. At Bowie State University, she contributed to campus life as an Executive Member of the International Student Association, supporting cultural inclusion, event planning, and student engagement. Across banking, HR, and project management roles, her leadership consistently emphasizes collaboration, mentorship, and meaningful impact.

Adeola Oshiyemi's journey reflects the values of scholarly inquiry, service, and leadership that define the Graduate School at Bowie State University, positioning her as a strong example of how interdisciplinary learning can translate into real-world impact.



A CONVERSATION WITH ADEOLA OSHIYEMI

Kiser: Can you walk me through your academic focus and how management information systems, human resources, and project management intersect in your work?

Oshiyemi: My academic interests sit at the intersection of management information systems, human resources, and project management, where data-driven decision-making supports people-focused strategies. My work centers on using technology and structured systems to improve organizational efficiency, workforce performance, and strategic planning. Together, these disciplines allow me to approach organizational challenges holistically—balancing technical solutions with human-centered leadership.

Kiser: You've worked on research involving family-friendly programs and insider threat management. What were the core questions or insights you uncovered?

Oshiyemi: One project focused on how institutions can better support student-parents by becoming more family-friendly. We examined how access to on-campus childcare and support services could reduce stress and improve academic outcomes for students with children. Our team used collaborative analysis to understand the issue from multiple perspectives, which helped identify key gaps and opportunities for improvement within campus systems.

Kiser: As a graduate assistant, what types of research or program development projects did you support, and which had the greatest impact?

Oshiyemi: I supported several research initiatives, including a study on student academic performance in relation to parental education levels. We found that students whose parents had higher levels of education tended to perform better academically. I also assisted faculty with literature reviews, data management, qualitative interview coding, and manuscript preparation. One of the most impactful projects involved analyzing student learning outcomes to inform curriculum revisions, which directly strengthened departmental assessment strategies.

Kiser: What strategies did you use to successfully hire 30 employees within six months in your HR and recruiting role?

Oshiyemi: I implemented a structured, data-driven recruitment strategy by leveraging multiple sourcing channels, including LinkedIn Recruiter, job boards, professional associations, and employee referrals. I also standardized screening processes to identify high-quality candidates quickly and partnered closely with hiring managers to clarify expectations and streamline interview scheduling.



A CONVERSATION WITH ADEOLA OSHIYEMI

Kiser: You've used mixed methods research in your academic work. Can you describe a project where this strengthened your outcomes?

Oshiyemi: In my research on parental education and student performance, I began with quantitative surveys to identify trends in academic outcomes and demographics. I then conducted qualitative focus groups and interviews with students and parents, which added depth and context to the numerical data and strengthened the overall findings.

Kiser: How have certifications like Scrum Master and CompTIA Security contributed to your leadership in technology-driven environments?

Oshiyemi: Scrum training has helped me structure my daily workflow and manage projects more effectively by prioritizing tasks and tracking progress. CompTIA Security has made me more security-conscious, especially when working with systems and data, allowing me to approach technology with greater awareness and responsibility.

Kiser: What motivates your commitment to service and leadership?

Oshiyemi: I genuinely love serving others and putting smiles on people's faces. I believe that helping one person can positively impact many more. When I can't help directly, I try to connect people with others who can. Service is central to who I am.

Kiser: How would you describe your experience as a graduate student at Bowie State University?


Oshiyemi: Bowie State has been very welcoming, especially as an international student. From the International Office to the College of Business and the Graduate School, I've felt supported throughout both of my master's programs. The faculty, student organizations, and leadership within the Graduate School have all contributed to a positive and enriching experience

Kiser: What advice would you give to graduate students pursuing a similar path?

Oshiyemi: Don't isolate yourself—ask questions, talk to people, and join your department's student association. Participation matters, especially in the classroom. Build relationships with professors and make your advisor your ally. Being engaged makes a significant difference in your success.


