That your petitioner verily believe that the property described was [9] under the following circumstances, or one or more of such circumstances, viz:

1. For the actual use of the army, and not so, the mere gratification of individual officers or men already provided by the Government with such articles as were necessary or proper for their use.
2. In consequence of the failure of the troops of the United States to receive from the Government any necessary munition, or to have in their possession at the time, the articles and supplies necessary for them, or which they were entitled to receive and have.
3. In consequence of some necessity for the articles taken, or similar articles, which necessarily belong to the officers or soldiers taking them.
4. For some purpose so necessarily, useful, beneficial or justifiable as to warrant or require the Government to pay for it.
5. Under the order or authority of some officer, or other person connected with the army, whose rank, situation, duties, or other circumstances at the time authorized, empowered, or justified him in taking or receiving it, or ordering it to be taken or received.

That [10] Patsey Campbell of Liberty County & State Georgia was the original owner of said claim, and that she is

the present owner of the same [11]

That your petitioner remained loyally adherent to the cause and the Government of the United States during the war, and was so loyal before and at the time of the taking of the property for which this claim is made, and he solemnly declare that, from the beginning of the hostilities against the United States to the end thereof, her sympathies were constantly with the cause of the United States; that she never, of her own free will and accord, did anything, or offered, or sought, or attempted to do anything, by word or deed, to injure said cause or retard its success, and that she was at all times ready and willing, when called upon, or if called upon, to aid and assist the cause of the Union, or its supporters, so far as her means and power, and the circumstances of the case, permitted.

In answer to the First General Interrogatory, the Deponent says:

My name is Patsy Campbell, my age not known,
years, my residence I have no home, in the State of
Georgia, and my occupation a farmer; I am
related to the claimant, and have a beneficial interest in the claim.

Testimony of claimant on loyalty

- 1 Firs time in Liberty Co. Ga. a slave & to come free when the Yankees come for us. I have a child and old enough to be married & don't know my age. I live about half a mile from No. 3 on the Atlantic & Gulf Roads, Liberty Co., Ga. By farm for a living.
- 2 In 1861 April I lived on Mr. Allens place, & stand there all through the war. My master was dead & I used to cook for Mrs. Allen & the boys.
- 3 & 4 Irrelevant.
- 5 Never took the amnesty oath.
- 6-24 To each and every question being separately put the claimant answers no.
- 25 The confederates broke up my home & the Yankees took my house off.
- 26 I couldn't tell the Yankees master at that time - they said they would never give us \$150 as he did.
- 27 They never caught me - I run or let them scare me.
- 28 I never gave anything to the U.S. Government.
- 29 I couldn't do anything for the Yankees I was a slave and had to do what the master

- 4 39 to each and every question being separately put the claimant answers no
- 40 I was on the Union side when the war commenced & would die on it - I felt rejoiced at the glad tidings. We used to talk & I told my sister that I would rejoice & bless the Lord if he made us free & bless the people that God had blessed to make us free - I felt on the side of the Union with my whole heart, soul & body & when I die I expect to die one, (Union woman)
- 41 In conclusion I do solemnly declare that from the beginning of hostilities against the W. S. to the end thereof my sympathies were constantly with the cause of the Union, that I never of my own free-will and accord did anything or offered or sought or attempted to do anything by word or deed to injure said cause or retard its success & that I was at all times ready & willing when or if called upon to aid and assist the cause of the Union or its supporters so far as my means and powers and the circumstances of the case permitted
- 43 I was a slave at the beginning of the war & became free when the Yankees

came out here - After I became free I hired myself out to Mrs. Brewer and planted for her to make something to live on. Ever since I was old enough to raise any thing I raised hogs & poultry & bought a lot by selling them things & it grew to be a big house. I taught him sometime before the Yankees came he was little & he had grown a big house. I worked for my master by the task & afterwards I had time for myself. I used to plant a little corn for myself front of my house. Planted some rice too. My former master was Mr. Allen he died before freedom. This land now that belongs to Mr. George. I don't owe my master's estate anything. No one but me one has any interest in this claim.

I was born in Liberty Co., Ga. I was a slave & got my freedom since the rail came through. I belonged to Mr. Allen. I am 22 yrs. old. I live in Liberty Co. on Mr. Frazer's place. Work with a hoe for a living. I am no kin to Mrs. Patsey Campbell - only fellow servant. I have no beneficial interest to her claim. I have known her all my life times. I lived on the same place but not in the same house. I live in the same place that she does now. I never heard her say anything about the war, but she was a good Union woman all through the war.

Testimony of William Bacon on loyalty
I was born in Liberty Co., Ga. I was a slave & belonged to Mr. Bacon. I became free since the Yankees came. I am about 18 yrs. old. I am a day laborer - carpenter & chipping wood. I know Mrs. Campbell - she is no relation to me. I have no beneficial interest - all the interest I have is to tell what I know about it. I have known her as long as I could think. I lived 3 miles from her when the war was going on. I saw her once or twice a week. We were not allowed to talk about the war, but we did unbeknown to our master. I never used to go back to slavery. I want to be a freeman. Although I had as good a master as there was in this country. She hoped that we would be free so that we might live a better life - All talk'd like they didn't want to see so much talking & hashing as they had about them. She was one of the best Union women I knew. She was honest & good - no among 300. They took my clothes & took out my pocket book with \$26.50 in it of gold & silver - Learned it by working on the railroad up the country. I had \$27.50 in Confederate

money in my pocket but that was no better
than a newspaper after it is read. They
took 37 head of hog at my wife's house
I then took 22 out at my master's
house that belonged to me. I have

Testimony of claimant on property

- 1 I was present when the house and hog
were taken.
- 2 I saw them taken.
- 3 They said that if they didn't take
the house the rebels would & if the
Lord spared their lives they would
send it back after a long while.
- 4 The house was taken in Harrisville and
the pot too. It was taken when the
Yankees were gathering up things when
they were here. I don't know the time.
I never saw so many people since I
was born. I was scared to see so many
people come upon me that I could not
tell whether they were soldiers or not.
They just took them & went right off
without doing ride off the horses.
- 5 My brother Billy & his husband
& my mother was there. My brother was
William Bacon & Samson Bacon &
Jane Quattlebaum was there.
- 6 I didn't see any officer there. I didn't
hear any one order my house taken.
My old father tried to keep the horses
but a soldier said you had better let



- him go, for somebody else will come & take him.
- 7 They just came up & took the pot without asking anything & they took the horse the same.
- 8 I don't know they rode the horse off & the pot they took in their hands.
- 9 I don't know where they went with them. I suspect they carried them to their camps. I didn't bother with them at all. I let them go free.
- 10 I suppose they used the horse to ride about - they were horsemen that took him. I didn't see them owing them. I haven't seen them from that day to this.
- 11 I never made any complaint.
- 12 I didn't ask for any voucher or receipt.
- 13 The horse & pot were taken in the day-time about 12 o'clock. They did not take it secretly.
- 14 I couldn't tell whether they were encamped or not. I just saw the gang come up. I heard afterwards this Shiloh army was encamped at Midway church. They said it was Sherman's company. They staid on the place that day & 2d or 3d came a day or two

- afterwards - I don't know that they had had any battles or skirmishes just yet. They took my horse. I didn't know this, for ears or gatekeepers.
- 15 My father had taken the horse from Mr. Halleys last horse down to the road to visit the Yankees. He rode him away from home in his way, coming back. They rode the horse right out of the kitchen.
- 16 Horse No. 1. I bought the horse when he was a colt. I sold 4 horses & my father rated & scraped the rest out & helped me out with it. The horse was as fat as they could be. I sold these to buy this colt. My father has been dead 5 yrs. I wanted him to take up my ground & if I wanted to get my place and was crippled up. I would ride - my father was crippled up with the rheumatism & he used him some to ride. I can put him up at 5 yrs. old. He was full-grown in big stout horse with a black mane & tail & cream colored. He was as sound as he could be, every bit and that horse - he was just as fat as he could be - stall fed. He had a good eye as ever a horse had.

Testimony of Rosa Jane Dardanen
on property:

1. I was right there when the horses were taken.
2. I saw them taken.
3. They didn't say anything much but took the horses right away.
4. They were taken at ~~Hartville~~ the day that the "Parade" came in. I don't remember the year. The Indians took the horses & took it was a gang of them. I couldn't tell how many there were. There were but 2 came in & took the horses & one took the pot. They were "no time" in taking them.

- 5 There were present Mrs. Campbell
Lucy Allen, Samson Bacon, William
Bacon & others.
- 6 I didn't see any officers there.
- 7 They came up & took the house while
we were coming from watching. They got
on this horse as soon as they got to
the gate & rode him off. They came
into the kitchen & took the pot.
- 8 They rode the horse & carried the pot
in their hands.
- 9 They carried it where they were going. I
don't know where they went. I didn't
follow them.
- 10 I don't know what we they made of
the house after they carried it. Some
of them riding off. I saw them carrying
the pot in Hainesville where they
were camped.
- 11 I didn't hear any complaint made.
- 12 I didn't hear any voucher or bill
asked for.
- 13 The property was taken in this manner.
They came first at 12 o'clock. They
took it plain everybody there was
there.
- 14 They were camped around in Haines
ville - not far off. They staid all night.
I just know they were Yankees because



- 14 They said so & they had on blue cloths.
The confederates had on different cloths.
I think they staid 3 or 4 days. I didn't hear
any officers or quartermasters.

large & of the kitchen.

as fat as he could be. He was cream
color'd - he was as sound and healthy

on them catch the horses & ride him

a family wanted - they could take
clothes in it. I was there when they
took it - it was in the ^{kitchen} oven when they
took it - it had dinner cooked in it. They
took the dinner & all & carried it off.

Testimony of William Bacon (col) on
property

- 1 I was present when this property was taken.
- 2 I saw them take the horse & oven.
- 3 There were 2 came up to the house & one said you needn't fire it hard if it goes if he don't take ^{them} some one will take them - the rebel cavalry they said would take him.
- 4 It was taken at Hinesville on her (Mrs. Campbell's place) on her master's plantation - it was taken when the Yankee soldiers were there - The Yankee soldiers took them, 2 soldiers - they didn't take anything. They just took them & went off.
- 5 Rosa Jane Duesterman, Samson Bacon, William Bacon (that's me) & Billy Bacon her brother he is sick - we present.
- 6 The officers were around every place where the men were taking things I knew them by their uniforms. I could read. I could tell their names from their caps but I couldn't read. I know Kilpatrick's men did the most harm round Hinesville - The officers told me that it was Kilpatrick's men who came & destroyed the colored folks' things - I was so excited to see it.



- many that I didn't notice any orders but afterwards they told me that they had orders & they said we won't keep anything but.
- 7 The old man - father of Pitoy - has just sold the house out to him & they came right up & took the saddle out of his hand. He was an old man & had raised this colt for his daughter & he used to ride it some; he trotted a good deal about then & taking it they came right into the kitchen and took the oven. I saw them coming out with it.
- 8 They led the horse from the door & rode him afterwards - they carried the hot iron in their hand.
- 9 They started right back to where they were camped at do. 3 At S. R. R.
- 10 I don't suppose they could have made any use of the hot but to cook us it. I didn't see them use it. Four men were in the house every day after they took it until they left the place where they were camped.
- 11 I heard her tell the officers that they had taken her good horses. They told her she would get it back - that was

- the comfort they gave to all the colored folks -
- 12 I heard her ask someone for a receipt. They didn't do it - I asked one & I didn't get it - she asked any one. She could see dressed in uniform.
- 13 The property was taken in the morning. It was taken publicly.
- 14 When they took this property they were encamped at do. 3. about 3 miles off. They came there a short time after they got into camp - They staid there 3 or 4 miles. I think. It must have been Kilpatrick's men that took the property. They didn't stop & wait - they just rode through. When they came back they wouldn't leave so much as a sparrow. I didn't know any officers or cavalry masters -
- 15 It was a nice built cream house - in good condition -
- 16  Stein do. 1. This was a cream house dark mane & tail - he was a well built horse; he was broad in the rump & shoulders fat as he could be - And strong sized horse. It was a colt a year older before the war. I think he was 6 or 7 yrs. old. I saw them ride the horse off.

18 Stein do. 2. This was a good large oven - not the biggest size - they could use it to wash up if they wanted to. This property all belongs to Mrs. King
