That your petitioner verily believes that the property described was [9] Tolson under the following circumstances, or one or more of such circumstances, viz:

1. For the actual use of the army, and not for the mere gratification of individual officers or soldiers already provided by the Government with such articles as were necessary or proper for them to have.
2. In consequence of the failure of the troops of the United States to receive from the Government in the customary manner or time in their possession at the time the articles and supplies necessary for them, or which they were entitled to receive and have.
3. In consequence of some necessity for the articles taken, or similar articles; which necessity justified the officers or soldiers taking them.
4. For some purpose so necessary, useful, beneficial, or justifiable as to warrant or require the Government to pay for it.
5. Under the order or authority of some officer, or other person connected with the army, whose rank, situation, duties, or other circumstances at the time authorized, empowered, or justified him in taking or receiving it, or ordering it to be taken or received.

That your petitioner remained loyally adherent to the cause and the Government of the United States during the war, and was so loyal before and at the time of the Tolson of the property for which this claim is made, and he solemnly declares that, from the beginning of hostilities against the United States to the end thereof, his sympathies were constantly with the cause of the United States; that he never, of his own free will and accord, did anything, or offered, or sought, or attempted to do anything, by word or deed, to injure said cause or retard its success, and that he was at all times ready and willing, when called upon, or if called upon, to aid and assist the cause of the Union, or its supporters, so far as his means and power, and the circumstances of the case, permitted.

represents that he has heretofore filed with the above-named Commissioners a  
Petition for the allowance of a claim for property <sup>taken</sup> for the use of  
the army of the United States, which claim, as stated below, does not exceed the  
sum of three thousand dollars.

Testimony of claimant  
interrogation by Special Commissioner.  
My Name is Siley Baker. I was born on  
Thomas Bacon Plantation in Liberty County  
Georgia, a slave, and became free when the  
Union Army came into the County. I am  
about 45 years of age, I reside on Major  
William Thompson Plantation, I work at  
farming. I am the claimant in this  
case.

25 From the 1<sup>st</sup> of April 1861 to the 1<sup>st</sup> of June 1865  
I resided on Raymond Bay St Plantation  
I was a field hand I did not change my  
residence or occupation between those dates  
It is irrelevant.

26 to 28 Inclusion to each and every question the  
claimant answer "No"

29 After the Yankees came into the County  
I cooked and worked for them till they  
went away, I think they were in our  
neighborhood over 3 weeks some paid me  
for little jobs, I did not make any charges,  
I was only to glad to do for them. They gave  
down little payment, I was satisfied - somehow  
if I would do this or that they would pay  
me they went away without paying me

I was so glad to be free I could have worked  
till this time.

30 to 39 To each and every question the claimant answer "No"  
41 At the beginning of the war I sympathized  
with the Union cause or the Yankee cause  
as we called it, but I could not speak it  
I pit all the time for the Yankee when  
ever I heard of a battle and did like they  
came into the County. I cast all the info  
I had on the Union side, we were talking  
about the war all the time among ourselves  
in the fields and in the woods, we never  
spoke loud, we had to think and whisper.  
When we were hid we were afraid.

43 In conclusion I do solemnly declare that from

43 At the beginning of the rebellion I was alone and became free when the Union Army came into the County - After I became free I kept right on farming - My husband was many or them for our master and had been for several year before the War, or he thought his master would make him present some time soon give him \$20. in cash we raised Poverty, Hope, and Com and rice to sell get the money & when we got enough together we bought a Mare and raised Cattle, this man charged us my claim or one we raised from the Mare we bought, we bought the buggy stamp in the same way, I worked "at task work" and got time to do a good deal for myself in that way I could help my husband to "accumulate" many slave made enough in that way to buy their freedom but they so often got cheated out of their freedom but you could risk it. Raymond Keye was my master - I am not in his employ I do not live on his land, or land buyer of him, I am not indebted to him - he is living, now in Walthamville County County Ga - I and my children are the only parties interested in this claim - I have 7 children 3 girls and 4 boys - all the larger ones are living in Marion New Market County Georgia

now named). My husband died the 2<sup>nd</sup> year after freedom - he did not owe a cent to any body when he died - My Attorney is a son of my old master - Raymond Keye 2<sup>nd</sup> set of interrogatories by Special Commissioner  
1<sup>st</sup> I was present when the soldiers took the entire of property specified in my petition.  
2<sup>nd</sup> I saw them take all of the property  
3 When they came up to my house they ordered the boys to catch the horse and to put the saddle and bridle on to him - they ran for their horses to do it they did catch them and they mounted them and rode off - they brought their own saddle and bridle, they went on and took all the property from me, and all the rest on the place they made no difference they took it all clean from white as well as from the black -  
4<sup>th</sup> The property was taken at my house on Raymond Keye Plantation in Decem. in 1864, I can't remember the day of the Month it was taken by the Yankee soldiers I do not know what company they belonged to they were all on horses, I can't tell how many there were they were so thick I could not count them or see through them they were just like a flock of blackbirds only you could not scare them - they were several days taking the property they came one

- day and then became jump a day, &  
kept on till they got all I had and  
the other had on the Plantation.
- 5 I was present, William Robert, William James  
Peter Bear, My husband was present but  
he is dead.
- 6 I saw officer there with the soldiers I  
do not know the Company or regiment, I think  
they said they belonged to Kilpatrick Army  
I did not hear the officer give any  
order but they were on their horses  
and looking on while the soldiers were  
taking the things.
- 7 They saddled & harnessed the horses and rode  
off they put one of their horses to my  
buck, using my harness, loaded it up with  
Corn "Tater" & bacon and drove off then  
they shot cut her up put it on to the  
horse and went off to the camp, the Rice  
and Corn was in the loft of my house they  
sacked the Corn and Rice and put it into  
a wagon.
- 8 The property was removed in wagons &  
on horses.
- 9 It was removed to the camp at Midway  
I did not follow it they went there because  
they went on that road, and could not  
go any where else on the road they took.  
They took the things for them and when they
- 10

- used it or a good deal of it right then attorney  
harris, I kept cooking for them as long as I  
had anything left, they killed all of  
My Poultry and cooked it for them about 15  
heads.
- 11 I did not make any complaint to any  
one on account of such taking after I  
understand what it must I was glad  
that I had anything for them.
- 12 I did not ask <sup>for</sup> any one for a horse or  
receipt.
- 13 The property was all taken in the day  
time at all hours mostly at mid day.
- 14 When they took the property the Army  
was encamped at Midway about 3 miles  
from my house on Long Plantation, but Kilpatrick's  
Army was encamped, that bear what  
it was called, they came to my house I  
think the next day after they landed in  
Midway - then had not been any Bacon or  
Meat near there just before the property  
was taken - they staid at Midway about  
3 weeks it may have been 4 weeks I did  
not know any of the Quartermaster or  
any of them or any of the other officers  
of the Army.
- 15 The property they took from me was all  
in very fine condition the Rice had  
been threshed and put away for sale over

the corn ear gathered stored away in  
the loft of my house.

16 Item No 1 The Mare was about 10  
year old; the Mare bear a good medium  
size animal was very fat and well  
broke to work any where. My husband  
raised her from the first. When he knew  
the soldier rode her off -

Item No 2 The buggy wear a good leather  
buggy on Springs. We did not use the buggy  
only on Sundays, it wear in first rate  
order the harness was a good leather  
harness, the soldier came with a gun  
put the harness on and hitched him to  
the buggy loaded it up and drove off

Item No 3 The sow wear a large fat  
sow I did not weigh her they killed the  
sow, Cut her up, and put the meat on to  
the horn and went off. I have no  
judgment on the weight of the sow she was  
large and fat that is best I can say about  
it she wear about 2 year old -

Item No 4 I raised the rice - planted  
3 $\frac{1}{2}$  bushels of Rice it wear threshed measure  
and put away - it wear in nice order  
they took it away in sacks and put into  
barrels and drove off them wear thirty five  
bushels of it -

Item No 5 I raised 3 bushels of corn it was

in the ear and necessary for 20 bushels of corn  
the corn ear in the loft of my house &  
taken by the soldiers just as they took  
the Rice -

Testimony of Witness

Interrogatories by Special Commissioner.  
My name is Wm. Roberts. I was born in  
Lexington Co Ga, a slave; became free when the  
Yankees came here. My master was Raymond  
Lang Jr. I am about 30. I reside at the  
same place Mr Lang's place now. I am a  
farmer & carpenter & blacksmith. I know  
the claimant and I am not related to her. I have  
no written record of her claim & have known her down  
26 years. She is a widow. I know her husband.

- He died I think 2 years after he was. He was a very good man & his wife a good man woman.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> set of interrogatories by Special Commissioner.
- 1<sup>st</sup> I was present when the seizure of the property was taken from me.
2. I saw the mace, & bugle & harness, & the sword, also some of the poultry & the things out of the house taken.
- 3 They said to her that they wanted some provisions, that they come to buy, & she said she didn't think they would take from her, & they said yes, they must take from all, because they had nothing to eat. They went in & commenced to take, & said no ~~agreed~~, but asked her to cook something for them, & she said went on & did it, & meanwhile I went off to attend to those who were then taking from me. My house was within calling distance from hers.
4. This property was taken at Claimants' home on Mr. Bay's plantation, on the 15<sup>th</sup> of Dec. I don't know the year exactly but I know it was the year the said came. It was taken by Union Soldiers of Kilpatrick's army. They were a cavalry company & I don't know the exact number but there was a large number taking. I think they were taking 2 or 3 days off & on.
5. The Claimant's husband, Alvin Baker, <sup>were present</sup> his son, & Anna Baker, his daughter, & Peter Way was a little ways off, when this property was taken.
6. There were officers present. I do not know their

rank & we think they were sergeants & lieuts. I saw 2 stripes & 3 stripes. They ordered this property taken. They just said they must have the property & went on & took it.

7 They caught the mare & took her off horse back. The harness & wagon they put their own horse in that. They killed the cow & cut it in two & hung it to the saddle & took it to camp. They took the rice & corn in packs from up stairs in the loft, he was an old Driv'r & when he took sick, they took me for a driver.

8 They removed most of this property or horse back. Some of it was removed in wagons.

9 They removed this property to camp at Midway Church. I went to Midway myself the first <sup>day</sup> with them & saw them take it there.

10 They said they took it for the horses & themselves to eat, they said they had nothing for either to eat. I saw them use a little of it there at the house to take bread. I did not see any of it used at the camp.

11 I did not hear anyone make any complaint on account of the taking of the property.

12 I did not hear any one ask for a doctor or receipt.

13 This property was taken most of it in the day time, about 10 or 11 o'clock.

14 The Army were encamped when this property was taken, at Midway Church, 3 miles from Clary's house. It was Kilpatrick's Army encamped

there. I think they staid there 6 weeks at Midway Church. They were riding through to Bryan Co & back. Midway Church was their head quarter. They were gathering up supplies all the time here in these 2 counties Bryan & Limestone. I did not know any of the quartermasters or other officers of the Army.

15 This property was in very good condition when taken.

16 Item No 1. - This was a sorrel mare. I think she was near 2 years old. I guess her age by the age of my mare. I think they were nearly on edge. She was a medium sized mare, good bodied. He raised this mare. He bought the mother of this mare, & raised this one. The soldiers rode the mare away. I saw them.

Item No 2. - This was a spring buggy, for 2 to ride in, one seat. He had had this buggy a long time, it was a good buggy & a fine & a good harness, he brought it since he did the buggy. It was a leather harness. I did not see the buggy taken away. I saw it there in the morn & when I came back from the camp the old man told me they took his buggy too.

Item No 3. - One sow. I think she was 2 years old. She was a large, fat, sow. I think would weigh 150 lbs. They killed her & cut her up right there. I saw them kill her & take her off.

Item No 4. - She had a good pile of rice. I think he had \$ planted about an acre but a little
